Sixth Form Tectonics Conference

Last Friday, 20 Lower and Upper Sixth Geography students enjoyed an amazing opportunity to attend a series of lectures in London by some of the UK's leading scientists in the field of tectonics. Danniella Page (Upper 6) has sent in this report from what sounds like a very educational and inspiring day:

"Speakers included Dr Martin Degg, Dr Debbie Milton, David Redfern, Professor Iain Stewart, Professor Fiona Tweed and Sue Warn.

The lectures varied from tectonic hazards in Iceland to the different dangers of plate boundaries. Of particular interest to me was Professor Iain Stewart's lecture, who discussed the dangers of collapsing buildings during earthquakes. He spoke about different methods of making buildings more resistant to earthquakes, including the Hagia Sophia in Istanbul, which was retrofitted with concrete fortresses to withstand the shaking.

The speakers provided an insight into the different hazards of seismic and volcanic events, including plenty of case studies and exam tips. We all had an inspiring and interesting day."

Under the supervision of Mrs Burt, together with a team of experts from PS-Stem, our guests learned about some key concepts of Computer Science.

This was a great opportunity to experiment with Kano, a computer that clicks together like LEGO and guides students simply through computing and coding. Mrs Burt tells me that this system completely demystifies technology in a human way, 'empowering curious minds to create with technology.'

It certainly sounds ingenious and I know our guests really enjoyed some great sessions with all their teachers saying how much they had all learned.

Equally, 'Hour of Code Week' starts next Monday and I know there are plans afoot for us all to be actively participating in this annual event. The girls will be encouraged to enhance their Coding and Programming skills within school, plus we're hoping staff will have a go too!
