Primary School Mathematics Challenge

We started this week with hosting the third annual Primary Schools Mathematics Challenge involving schools from around Devon. We welcomed boys and girls from St Michael's C of E Primary (Kingsteignton), West Hill Primary, Clyst St Mary Primary, Doddiscombsleigh Primary, Kenton Primary, St John's School (Sidmouth) and last year's winners, Bowhill Primary, in addition to our own Maynard representatives. A couple of schools had to withdraw at the last minute but they will be back again next year! In total, there were 10 teams of four pupils, chosen by their schools as their most gifted and talented mathematicians and each team included a member of staff or parent



helper who assisted with the marking during the day.

In essence, the competition featured six very different rounds, all of which posed some incredibly tricky questions and problems to tackle. To give you a flavour of exactly the level at which these students are working at I will share with you one of the 15 questions in Round One:



The local hotel has 200 rooms. The rooms are numbered in ascending order starting with the number 1. None of the rooms have a number which is a multiple of 13 or has the sum of the digits of the room number equal to 13. These rooms are given names instead of numbers. How many rooms have names instead of numbers?

It really was a taxing day on the brain but Andrew's famous Maynard cookies kept everyone going strong and they also enjoyed a very tasty picnic lunch which put them in good stead for the afternoon's rounds. At the end of the day, Clyst St Mary scored the highest to win the competition followed by Doddiscombsleigh and West Hill Primary.

Huge congratulations to India Leetham (Upper 4) and Milly Bennett (Upper 6) who both won their respective events to become the Devon Champions at the County Athletics Championships held last weekend. India cleared a massive 1.50m in the Junior Girls High Jump whilst Millie leaped to victory in





the Senior Girls Long Jump. Both girls are now proud recipients of the official Devon Athletics kit and will go forward to represent the County at the South West Championships tomorrow (with Milly also competing in the 4 x 100m relay team). Well done!

Equally, there were some fabulous individual and team performances from over 30 of our students in Years 7-10 at the annual Exeter Inter Schools Athletics Championships on Wednesday. With stand-out performances in all age categories, and lots of 1st – 3rd placings, we were thrilled to finish as
