German Exchange with Scharnhorst Gymnasium Hildesheim

On Thursday 19 October, nine girls from Years 9 and 10 set off with Mr O'Neill on the first leg of the German Exchange. We were greeted at Hanover airport by our exchange partners, many of whom had gone to great lengths to produce welcome banners and signs.

Our first morning was spent in school which gave us an opportunity to catch up on some of the idiosyncrasies of life in Germany such as the preponderance of sparkling water and the strange shelf or ledge that many German toilets have. After a few lessons with our partners, we had a tour of the old town of Hildesheim and saw, amongst other things, the 1000-year-old rose at the cathedral and the unpronounceable Knochenhaueramtshaus.

The weekend was spent with our exchange families and excursions included trips to Hannover Zoo and the Phæno Science Center, an interactive science centre in Wolfsburg. Some girls even visited Bremen and Berlin.

On Monday, we visited the Rausch Schokoland museum in Peine where we had an interactive tour about chocolate production that tested Mr O'Neill's interpretation skills somewhat.

Tuesday was again spent in school. It was interesting to note how different lessons were. In the absence of computers and interactive whiteboards, teachers still taught with chalk!





A day trip to Clausthal-Zellerfeld and Goslar in the beautiful Harz region were a real highlight of the trip. A tour of the Oberharzer Bergwerksmuseum, one of the oldest technological museums in Germany which concentrates on the history of mining in the Upper Harz up to the 19th century, taxed Mr O'Neill's interpretation skills more than the trip to Schokoland. Goslar is a beautiful unspoilt town located on the north-western slopes of the Harz mountain range. The girls were allowed to explore the cobbled streets and traditional shops before we had a tour of the Imperial Palace.

The week flew by and, apart from Mr O'Neill nearly forgetting the pack lunches on the journey out and getting stuck on a Spiderman ride at the airport, went without hitch. The girls' behaviour was exemplary as was their willingness to risk Roggenbrot and brave Bockwurst. Mr O'Neill who has run this trip many times said this particular exchange was the best he had ever led.

We look forward to welcoming our German friends in the Spring!



Spanish Trip to sunny Salamanca

During half term, eleven girls from Years 10 and 11 spent a fabulous week in Salamanca, Spain where the temperatures hit 24 degrees minimum each day.
