### Girls into STEM event sparks hot competition



The Maynard 'Girls into STEM' day was a unique and inspiring event on Tuesday. The engineering challenges and mathematical problems were hotly contested between the teams at the event, which comprised of 90 girls, including 40 from local schools. Indeed, such was the quality of their designs and the creativity and innovation of their solutions that it was very difficult to judge!

We were delighted to welcome Dr Juliette Jackson and Kate Purver, both expert Engineers, who delivered presentations

on their varied and exciting careers. As part of our bespoke day we also welcomed PhD students Natalie Whitehead and Lauren Barr, who are both physicists at the University of Exeter, who offered valuable insight into studying STEM subjects at university.

We are passionate at promoting STEM careers to our students, and events like this are important parts of our comprehensive STEM programme, which also includes an Upper Three STEM Club, a Lego Robotics club, a Physics Film Makers Competition, Physics Olympiads, Physics Team Challenges, visits to the university to meet postgraduate students, opportunities for work experience with global Engineering giant Atkins, and a whole host of lectures which have recently included Helen Sharman and a NASA rocket scientist. With over 25% of our 2017 Sixth Form leavers choosing STEM courses at university, we are very proud of the work that we are doing in promoting these subjects.





#### Coder Dojo Marathon

Five of our students took part in the Thomson Reuters Girls Only Coder Dojo Marathon held in Exmouth last weekend. Aimed at girls aged from 7-15 years, it was wonderful to hear that Isabel Board (Year 6), Millie Allott (Year 6), Penny Robshaw (Lower 4), Isabella Flashman (Upper 5) and Sara Al-Seady (Upper 5) were going the extra mile outside school to further develop their coding and designing of websites and apps!

The girls got stuck in from the word 'go' creating their own games, mazes and even comic strips using programmes such as Scratch and Python. It was fantastic to see them working together to trouble shoot problems along the way and share their accomplishments at the end of the afternoon. They also had the opportunity to meet other girls attending Dojos in Washington DC, New York and London through a live web link.



#### Senior Team Mathematics Challenge

Our team of Jess Carr and Hayley Sun (both Lower 6), Ellen Player and Destiny Wang (both Upper 6) performed superbly at Monday's Devon Regional Final of the Senior Team Mathematics Challenge (for Sixth Form students) held at Exmouth Community College. #### Mathematical Olympiad for Girls

Also congratulations to Jess Carr, Gigi Hetherington, Alex Pavic (all Lower 6) and Ellen Player (Upper 6) who completed the three hour long examination at the Mathematical Olympiad for Girls last month. This was an enormously tricky paper, aimed at girls in Year 13 (Upper Sixth), for which only the best mathematicians in the country are nominated so sitting it alone is a real accolade! Particular mention must go to Jessica Carr who, despite effectively being a year young, was awarded a certificate of Distinction, something afforded to only the top 25% of participants.
