### Sport news

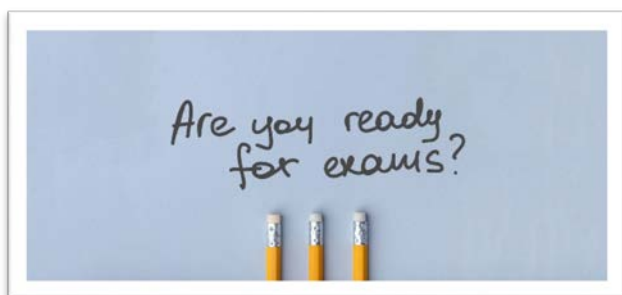

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### Examinations Information area on the website



The school website now has an 'Examinations Information' section, which can be found under the Academic tab. You will find lots of useful and important information here relating to GCSE and A level external examinations, but also internal examinations.

What will you find?

- Important student guidance from JCQ, the examination governing body, about the rules and regulations regarding coursework, controlled assessment, non-examination assessment (NEA), using social media wisely and how to avoid plagiarism. Instructions for written exams including what items can be taken into the exam hall and, more importantly, the things that are banned.
- There are two appeals policies outlining what to do if a student is not happy with her results and NEA marks.
- A student and parent information booklet outlining what to do if you are late on the day of an exam, special consideration, collecting results and revision tips and hints.
- The GCSE and GCE timetable for 2018.
- A form to use if a student cannot collect exam results in person.
- At the appropriate times, we will also display mock and internal exam timetables.

Our website does also contain a 'UCAS & Careers' section which has links to the most up to date medical courses, apprenticeships, careers open days and other careers related events. It is worth having a regular check of what is available!
