The brainchild of Mrs Reynolds, this was its fifth edition and, according to our seasoned regulars, the biggest and best yet. I can't thank Mrs Reynolds enough for working so tirelessly these last few months in building such a spectacular Show - there aren't the words to rave about it enough! My thanks also to those parents, guardians and friends of the school for so fully supporting it and it was lovely to see some of you in the crowd at the Private View on Friday. I am delighted to say that we smashed all previous records for artworks sold and, in so doing, we have raised an estimated £15,000 for YoungMinds. I will be sharing the exact figure with you just as soon as we have this information but, as fundraisers go, this truly is fantastic.





It was also wonderful to see so many classes from the Pre-Prep and Junior School drop in to look at the Show on Friday afternoon and they were all making some very insightful comments on the various works. It was an excellent opportunity for them to see so many different artistic styles and I can't help feeling that it will have left an indelible print on their imaginations for their own future projects.

As if organising such an enormous event wasn't enough, Mrs Reynolds has very ably also stepped in to the role as Acting Head of the Junior School, allowing Mr Smerdon to take this term off on his sabbatical. We wish her all the luck in this role and thank her for so capably taking up the reins!


On to the week's news...

A group of Upper and Lower 5 students took part in the History Study trip to the First World War Battlefields during the Easter holidays. We stayed in the beautiful town of Ypres which was completely destroyed during the First World War but never fell to the Germans and has since been rebuilt in the original fine medieval style. We had two brilliant guides for our tours of the Ypres Salient and the Somme battlefields. It was fascinating to see the difference between the British and the German cemeteries. We were able to walk through some original trenches which brought home the full horror of the war as well as the network of underground tunnels near Vimy Ridge where a group of Canadian soldiers had to remain in darkness and silence before their attack on 9 April 2017.

During our visit Polly Shaw laid a wreath commemorating her great great grandfather who served in three of the Ypres battles.



She did this during the very moving Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate. As part of our visit to the vast Thiepval memorial which is dedicated to those who fell on the Somme and have no known graves, Amelie Cosgrove read the poem "The Soldier" by Rupert Brooke and Alex Dean laid a wreath on behalf of The Maynard.

We also paid a special visit to the Devonshire Regiment's cemetery where there was an inscription "The Devonshires held this trench. The Devonshires hold it still". We recognised a number of familiar Devonshire names on the gravestones. On the last day we were also fortunate to be able to visit a brand

new installation in what was "No man's land' near Ypres. This consisted of 600,000 small clay figures representing the Belgian dead in the First World War. This was a breathtaking sight and a message of hope at the centre was a giant clay egg with a number of the clay figures about to hatch out which represent the hope that peace can eventually eradicate war but without ever forgetting the sacrifices made.

Amongst many memorable moments perhaps the most poignant was hearing the song of the skylark as we stood at the Lochnagar Crater on a beautifully sunny morning remembering the 19,240 British soldiers who died on the first day of the Battle of the Somme in July 1916.





National Championships success for Anya Hitt

Anya Hitt (Lower 5) enjoyed a busy (and very successful) Easter holidays competing with her horse, Cnoc an Noinin Clover (aka Dumpy), culminating in the British Dressage Pet Plan National Championships. Having qualified through the initial three rounds this was always going to be a hugely competitive test with Anya, at only 14-years old, competing in the hotly contested Under 18 Preliminary class. To have finished 6th out of 30 rivals, only 1% behind the eventual winner, is an incredible achievement and we wish her well for what promises to be a very bright future in this discipline.
