## Cross-curricular days celebrate the 'vote for women'

This week the Upper 3, Lower 4 and Upper 4 year groups took part in two days of exciting cross-curricular activities relating to Votes for Women in this 100th anniversary year of women first being allowed to vote in the UK. Inspired and organised by Miss Blackwell, these thought-provoking activity days enabled the girls to investigate the history of women's suffrage and learn about other human rights issues and social changes since 1918 in fun and memorable ways.





Starting off with an assembly covering topics such as the British suffragettes and the status of women's rights in Saudi Arabia, the activities incorporated music, drama, fashion and textiles, history, English, art, maths and physical exercise. The girls learned and energetically performed suffragette songs and reenacted events surrounding the fatal protest of Emily Wilding Davison, including poignantly imagining what she might have been thinking on that fateful day. They investigated fashion from the period and through the following decades, creating outfits from black plastic and newspapers for an entertaining and informative fashion show. In History and English they practised debating and created campaigning posters, examined literature from the suffrage movement and explored contemporary issues including #MeToo. In the art room the girls researched and drew notable women and gathered their pictures into a collage, while in maths they constructed voting questionnaires for the school community and collated their results.

The beautiful morning on Tuesday saw the whole group assembled on the tennis courts for a military-style drill, in which they learned how girls would have exercised in past times. The girls came together again for a closing assembly in which examples of their work were demonstrated to a very appreciative audience of pupils and staff.

In 1918, only women aged over 30 who owned property were given the right to vote, and in ten years' time it will be the 100th anniversary of women gaining equal voting rights with men. Something to keep in mind for 2028, Miss Blackwell?



#### The Primary Mathematics Challenge



On Tuesday, we welcomed 84 Year 5 pupils from 20 primary schools across the region for the annual Primary Mathematics Challenge, organised by Mrs Dersley and the Mathematics Department. Teams of enthusiastic budding mathematicians represented their schools in this fun all-day competition by completing a variety of exciting and challenging problem solving activities, from relav to crossnumbers (the mathematical equivalent of a crossword, of course). Pupils used their team-working and puzzle-solving skills while having fun doing maths. There was a really lively atmosphere with something for every pupil,

including a chance to sample one of the Maynard's famous cookies - thank you, Andrew, once again for an outstanding lunch and refreshments!

They returned on Monday to do some kayaking, learning the correct paddling technique, balancing on the outside of the kayak whilst





