Lower 5 French trip to La Rochelle

We had a wonderful time with 20 girls from the Lower 5 French group during the extra-curricular activities week. We flew from Bristol last Tuesday and arrived in La Rochelle in time for a late dinner in a restaurant overlooking the marina from where we were able to admire the sunset over the Atlantic.

After the Wednesday morning language lessons, we had a spot of lunch and headed to the best aquarium in Europe that houses the Sea Turtle rescue centre, the 360° jellyfish tunnel and the Gallery of Lights ... it was truly spectacular.

The next day, after some hard work on grammar and conjugation, we visited the arcades, the cathedral and the museum of Nouveau Monde, a fascinating insight into The New World and La Rochelle's role in the Slave Trade. We then had to stop at Ernest Le Glacier and choose from 80 different ice-cream flavours which took a while! We then explored the picturesque Old Port and finished the day in a pizzeria.





On Friday, on route for Île de Ré, we explored St-Martin-de-Ré, an historic fortified port town and a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2008. We had to practice some French to buy our lunch and visited the quaint little shopping streets whilst also enjoying some splendid views from the top of the Bell Tower. In the afternoon, we went to L'Abeille de Ré, a bee farm where we learned the know-how behind honey-making, an interesting visit ending in a shopping spree. We finished the tour of the island at the Phare de la Baleine, the second oldest lighthouse in France and still in use today. It offers some amazing views over the Atlantic coastline.

On Saturday, we spent a whole day in the centre of La Rochelle, visiting the famous towers of St-Nicolas and La Lanterne, exploring the old town, the shopping area, the market, the wonderful shops and the marina. We had some free time to finalise our shopping before going back to the airport.

All good things come to an end and all of us were very sad that the visit had gone so quickly. The girls had a great time and were a credit to our school. Needless to say, we are already looking forward to our next trip in June 2019.

Duke of Edinburgh Expeditions

The Maynard Rocket Club conquers the skies!

At 1600hrs on Thursday 5 July, armed with clinometers, a trundle wheel and a fire extinguisher, the crew of The Maynard Rocket Club embarked on their first mission. With the Civil Aviation Authority notified (really!), sunny skies and a light wind, everything was set for the launch of their four rockets, designed and built by the girls, at the Duckes Meadow sports ground.





Miss Dunn gave the countdown, Mr Ibrahim contacted air traffic control between each launch (really!), and brave Mr Ridler retreated to a safe distance of 200m with the students. The first launch was incredible: Lorelei, Lizzie and Isabelle's rocket soared to an estimated height of 140m! What happened next was unforgettable... Lucy and Rose's rocket, which they painted in Maynard tartan, went up and up and up! It seemed to climb forever; its parachute then deployed successfully, and it gently returned to earth. The students' measurements and calculations gave an estimated height of over a kilometre, putting the Maynard tartan at least 1% of the way to the edge of space - NASA watch out! Alex and Lauren's rocket managed a fantastic 130m after a last minute repair. Then, in a nerve-wracking climax, Carol, Angel and Linda's rocket performed a figure of eight, briefly endangered Miss Dunn, and embedded itself into the turf, much to the rather friendly groundsman's disbelief. During this time it reached a peak height of approximately 10m and provided considerable entertainment.

It was a thrilling way to end the school year. We are all so grateful to Mr Ibrahim for giving generously of his time and expertise in running the Rocket Club, and we are looking forward to more exciting STEM adventures next year.
