It was a very insightful and informal chat about how they both qualified, the highs, the lows and the difference between the two practices. For half an hour the girls were positively surrounded by an abundance of veterinary expertise and, as ever, they all rose to the occasion with intelligent and thoughtful questions.

The programme is arranged each term in response to demand from our students and we try to keep the weekly bookings as varied as possible to cover the widest audience. During this term alone, we have already welcomed an acute medicine consultant, a film producer/director, a fashion brand owner, a professional GB sportswoman and army captain, an expert in cyber security, an education consultant, volunteers within the international development/humanitarian sector and an ecologist. 
Don't forget the Junior School Book Fair!
