I gather the Upper 5 girls are having a great time in London with a host of exciting and varied activities including a West End Show, an open








top bus tour, museum trips and a meal out at Covent Garden. I am very jealous!

This year's fabulous Senior School production: 'The Caucasian Chalk Circle'



Rehearsals for this year's school play, 'The Caucasian Chalk Circle' by Bertolt Brecht, are well underway and, in total, we have a cast and production team of over 60 senior students from Year 9 up to the Sixth Form.

Originally written in 1945 against the postwar backdrop of huge upheaval and disarray in mainland Europe, we have given the play a slightly more modern twist to resonate with the socio-economic affair of today's world. We open with a scene set in the rubble of a bombed out village where two returning communities of farmers make a claim on the land they both consider to be their home. In a bid to bolster their claim, one side have brought in a famous local singer and prepared a play with music, The Chalk Circle, based on a Chinese parable. This story begins in the midst of a revolution, the Governor is executed, and his wife must flee. In the chaos, their infant son Michael is left behind. When no one else will take responsibility for the child, a servant named Grusha takes him up and goes on the run. The next three years unfold in a series of episodes showing how Grusha and Michael survive; the challenges they

face, the characters who help and hinder them. Do they stay together and can there be a future for them?

It is a fantastic and fast moving storyline raising questions about the choices people make in times of need and peril. It explores themes of belonging, motherhood, sacrifice and it portrays the underlying problems caused by war, homelessness and movement of people, making the play as relevant now as ever.

We have an excellent reputation for our compelling drama productions which are always a sell-out and this year is destined, once again, for the very same success. The play will take place over a three-night run (Wednesday 6 – Friday 8 March 2019) in the Performing Arts Centre at 7pm. Tickets (£7/adult and £5/child) are now on sale from Reception and we would urge you to purchase yours early to avoid disappointment!

Likewise, tickets are also now on sale for the Geography Department's much anticipated annual lecture, this year from top endurance athlete, adventurer and former GB rower, Anna McNuff. Named by The Guardian as one of the top female adventurers of our time. Conde Nast Traveller have also recently included her in a list of the 50 most influential travellers in the world.

Anna's major journeys include cycling a beautiful pink bicycle through each and every state of



the USA, running the length of New Zealand and, most recently, exploring the peaks and passes of the Andes Mountains – a journey in which she ascended the equivalent to eleven times the height of Everest on a bicycle.

"I get my kicks by travelling the world on long, human powered journeys, and in sharing those journeys with others. When not running up mountains or sleeping in the wild, I encourage others to grab life by the balls (non-scientific term), and speak and write about the importance of adopting a growth mindset (scientific term), in everything we do.

With a background in psychology and a career as an elite athlete under my belt, I'm fascinated by the powerful and delicate relationship that exists between mind and body. I have an insatiable thirst for exploring the limit of human potential, and in better understanding the (often misunderstood) feelings of fear, self-doubt, vulnerability and courage."

The lecture will take place in the Performing Arts Centre on Monday 18 March from 6pm. Open to all parents, friends and students in Year 7 upwards, tickets are now on sale from Reception at £8 each.

This has a huge impact on their education and can lead them to dropping out altogether, putting them at greater risk of child marriage and getting pregnant at a younger age.

At the last pad making session, the Textiles Room was packed with all our girls wanting to show a helping



hand and we hope to receive similar support this time. All the research shows that the pads we make are having an enormous impact on the Burburi community and attendance at schools is certainly muchimproved.
