### Biz Whizz Careers speakers for next week

Biz Whizz returns next Friday 18 October with another all-star cast of speakers. These careers talks are compulsory for all girls in Years 10 and 11 to attend and we ask that they sign up to one of the talks on the careers board outside the School Office. Equally, Sixth Formers are very welcome but, again, advance notice of which particular talk they would like to come to is required in order for us to keep an eye on numbers.

#### Talk #1

We welcome back Old Maynardian, Liberty Dixon, who is the Head of Foresight, Science and Technology at the Department of Trade as well as Senior Private Secretary to the Chief Scientific Advisor. "This involves influencing science policy and understanding how exciting new developments in science and technology may impact trade, from artificial intelligence and outer space through to your wearable Fitbits.

I am also responsible for making sure that the Department is thinking about the future - we often tend to look at very short timeframes but actually we need to



be preparing for the big things further down the line: such as climate change, an ageing population, global health and changing overseas markets. Just to note - working on trade basically means working on everything, as it is affected by many different things!"

#### Talk #2



As the Director for Crisis Response and Independent Living at the British Red Cross, Deborah Fisher OBE was previously a British Diplomat at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office for 23 years where she undertook a variety of roles and overseas postings including Tanzania, Paris and Ethiopia. In her final posting she was Deputy Head of Mission to the British Embassy in Ethiopia and Deputy Permanent Representative to the African Union. "My talk will focus primarily on the diplomatic service and the opportunities afforded by the voluntary sector, as well as how the development of transferable skills is key to a flexible and interesting career."
