This is a real achievement!

On the subject of 'spreading a little happiness'

We are equally proud of the girls in Year 4 who gave such a warm welcome to the ladies and gentleman from Bluebird Care who dropped in for afternoon tea and a chat recently. The joy that these sessions bring to both parties is palpable, as Mr Smerdon explains:

"We have been working with Bluebird Care for three years now and each term they join us for an afternoon, with classes taking it in turn to host our guests. I have to say that these are some of my favourite





events of the year and it is a great pleasure to see the girls chatting so freely with our Bluebird visitors and to witness the evident enjoyment of our guests at spending time with our students. It always reaffirms the lack of inhibition of youth as the children engage so easily with a much older generation, something that we adults can sometimes lose as we mature and become more self-conscious.

The pupils have sung songs, told stories, played board games as well as shared tea and cake with the Bluebird clients, who in turn have brought their own stories of

growing up and photos from their childhood to share with the children. After the sessions, it has been

wonderful to have the children genuinely buzzing with stories and excitement from the afternoon and to hear carers saying how animated and invigorated some of their quieter clients have been during the visit compared to on other days.

If I could bottle the essence of our school and encourage others to get involved, this would definitely be what I would choose. We always look forward to our next visit and hope that these will continue for many years, with strong friendships between the very young and very old at the heart of them."

Please can you help us out?

Our locally sourced cards and envelopes are produced from recycled paper, our designs from eco-friendly, lino-printed paint, and our gold stamp from reused candle wax. The hand-folded newspaper hearts at





their centre are filled with verbena bonariensis seeds, dried and packaged by us, that can be planted in Spring and grow into beautiful purple flowers. Perfect for the bees!
