Enjoyable trip to Tate Modern

At the crack of dawn last Saturday an excited group of Lower 5 Art students set off for the lights of London and specifically the delights of the Tate Modern. We walked along the embankment, pausing to enjoy the entertainment - a fire-throwing juggler- and then we entered the cavernous depths of the gallery. Our sights were first assaulted by the enormous dramatic 4-tiered fountain Fons Americanus sculpture by Kara Walker in the Turbine hall.

We spent time exploring the different gallery spaces until it was time to enter the Olafur Eliasson exhibition. What an immersive, all-consuming experience! We were all blown away! Eliasson puts experience at the centre of his art. As you encounter it, you become more aware of your senses. For Eliasson, this heightened awareness of yourself and other people creates a new sense of responsibility.

Afterwards, we looked at Yinka Shonibare's work which contrasted radically with what we had just seen but was colourful and very thought-provoking. After a walk back along the river, stopping to savour the Christmas lights, the crowds, and the flavours of the Churros stand and the Noodle bar, we arrived at Paddington in time to take a selfie with Paddington Bear and stock up on more supplies before our journey home.
