You can imagine just how delighted I was this week to see the Department for Education's Performance Tables and learn just how brilliantly we fared (once again) on both a regional and also national level. Year-on-year we always do well because we are, after all, an academically selective school with not only clever and diligent students who love to learn, but we also have some of the very best and most inspirational teachers that I have ever had the pleasure to work with.

That said, we certainly haven't been resting on our laurels and this has been a fantastic year insofar as these results go and I'm thrilled to say that we have formally been recognised, without a shadow of a doubt, as the undisputed top performing independent school in Devon in practically every measure across both the A-levels and GCSE results!

We thought you would like to celebrate this news so have already sent an email out about it but, for those of you that haven't yet seen this, here is a quick breakdown:

At GCSE level, we are the 4th best independent school in the whole of England for the all-important Attainment 8 score based on how students have performed across eight subjects including English, Maths, the sciences, geography, history and modern foreign languages. It is, if you like, the most comprehensive of the measures to show the all-rounded ability of each person sitting the exams (and that of their teaching also). From a total of 6274 schools being ranked, we sit in a very pleasing 60th place on this score nationally.

On top of this, we are also the country's 12th best independent school for the 'Grade 5 or above in English and maths GCSEs' measure but, most importantly, we are the highest ranked independent school this side of Bristol through to Land's End on absolutely every single measure!













Equally, we came out as the top independent school in the region for the fifth consecutive year for our A-level performances and have again been officially recognised for the Progress Score, showing how we can significantly improve a student's performance from her predicted grades to those that she ultimately achieves.

We were also the top ranked independent school across the whole of Dorset, Somerset, Devon and Cornwall (and 73rd from the 4470 schools listed) for the Facilitating Subjects measure that shows the percentage of girls who achieve AAB or higher in at least two of the most rigorous A-levels most commonly required to study at top universities.

This really is the most wonderful news and great cause for celebration! Not only that, but I hope it will act as some reassurance to all those girls who will be sitting their public examinations in the summer that they are in the best of hands, with very bright futures to look forward to if they can just stick at it for a few months more!

On a separate note, this has been another fun-filled and busy week; as I write the Year 2 girls are enjoying Paignton Zoo, the Year 6s loved their trip to the Plymouth Aquarium yesterday, the Upper 3s equally enjoyed the Eden Project on Wednesday and I'm delighted at the great gusto of the Lower 4s who have certainly been embracing their weekly rugby sessions with the Exeter Chiefs.

I must end by publicly commending the Manus Justa team comprising 13 Lower 5 and Lower 6 girls who performed so brilliantly at last Saturday's National Mock Trial competition. Although they weren't selected for the finals, they all played their parts with passion and enthusiasm and must only have missed out on qualification by the tiniest of margins. So my congratulations to them all and I'm delighted to hear that this is just a stepping stone for many who are looking to pursue a future career in law.

Incredible Gymnastics performances at the South West Championships

Congratulations to our four teams who competed in the British Schools Gymnastics Association South West Regional Floor and Vault Competition in Bideford last Sunday. This is a high-level competition with over 300 of the region's best gymnasts from schools who traditionally use this competition as an annual stepping stone to the Nationals! There was some incredible skill on show and the girls really enjoyed the experience of such a high level competition.

For our Under 11 girls this was for many of them their first experience of a formal gymnastics competition, understandably nervous they were all incredibly brave and performed their routines and vaults confidently in front of a big audience of gymnasts and spectators. With up to six girls in a team and 13 teams in each category it is far more common to come away without a medal or trophy than to win one, so a good measure of success is whether the gymnasts perform their routines and vaults cleanly (remembering the routine and no mistakes) rather than finishing in the top three. This can be a hard lesson to learn in gymnastics but to that end our girls were superb, we had no wobbles, tears or forgetful moments and they all did themselves and their coaches very proud.

That said we were elated that the Under 19 team won Team Bronze, especially as they were only a team of 4 so all of their scores counted to the team score, raising pressure and leaving no room for error. We were particularly pleased for the Under 19 captain, Martha, as this will be her last opportunity to represent the school in gymnastics as she is in Upper 6. Martha and Flo have been instrumental in the success of our partnership with Exeter Gym Club, helping us to take the junior school gym teams down for their training each week.







Final results were:

U19 Team: 3rd winning Bronze. Top performing Gymnasts was Flo who finished 5th as an individual

U14 Team: A team: finished 6th and B team finished 12th Top performing Gymnast was Connie who finished 6th as an individual

U11 Team: 4th top performing gymnast was Elizabeth who finished 12th as an individual

A brilliant day, and big thanks to all the parents who came to support the girls, and especially to our coaches Amy and Suzanne from Exeter Gym Club for their work in training, preparing and helping the gymnasts through the competition.
