Hannah (Upper 3) won the Verse Speaking 11 years and Rose was second, both with Honours.



This they did successfully dropping just one mark - they are now skilled in Linear Programming and can use it to solve a realistic problem found in the world of work.

The girls thoroughly enjoyed the challenge and the tour of the fascinating Met Office afterwards. Well done, girls!
