# GCSE **EXAMINATION GUIDE**

Welcome to this GCSE examination guidebook. We hope that you and your daughters find it a useful tool for the weeks leading into the exam period. In the guide we have provided some of our tips and advice on how best to prepare for these exams and how to address the varying demands of each subject.

Our wonderful Heads of Department have provided the subject-by-subject information within this guide, which may help clarify the examinations that your daughter will be facing and suggest how they might refine their revision resources and revision tasks.

This can, of course, be a testing time for all students and we will continue to ensure that our wellbeing hub is staffed prior to their examinations and that there will always be staff available to guide them through this exam process. We hope this guide provides some sense of balance and clarity as we approach this key period.

# **EXAM CHECK LIST**

### **GETTING READY:**

Make sure you have a copy of your **exam timetable**.

**Pin it** on your desk/notice board.

Make sure you have a **revision timetable**. Allocate appropriate time across your subjects.

**Start early** - this will give you time to ask your teachers for help if there is a topic you do not fully understand and will allow you to revisit topics just before the exam.

Remember to follow the **resources and strategies** as recommended by your teachers.

Remember to use the **learning platforms** and materials recommended by your teachers and ask for help if you are ever unsure of anything!

### **BEFORE AND DURING THE EXAMINATION PERIOD:**



- Leave your mobile phone **locked** away and away from exam spaces.
  - Enter and leave the exam room in complete **silence**. Remember as you are leaving some extra time candidates will still be working.
  - It is a good idea to take a transparent bottle of **water** to the exam room with you.
  - If you have a **pencil case** this should be of the clear, see-through plastic variety.

Bilingual **dictionaries** can be used by non-native English speakers but not for the English exam.





# **PREPARING FOR YOUR EXAMS**

### **SLEEP:**

NHS guidelines state that 14-16 year olds need 8- 9 hours of sleep a night. **This is essential** – a tired brain won't work very well and can lead to feelings of stress and anxiety.

**Stressed & can't sleep?** Warm bath, relaxation exercises & stretches, read a book, try sleep stories / music.

**Reduce screens in your bedroom:** TVs, tablets, computers - especially before bedtime. Research has proven that using an electronic device, even an hour before bedtime, badly affects both the onset of sleep and sleep duration.

**Don't revise on your bed** – keep it as a calm sanctuary! If you do, you risk falling asleep over your textbooks. Want a change of scenery? Make a comfortable spot on the floor, in the garden with cushions instead!

**Keep away from your phone and social media** during revision times – it is an amazingly proficient distraction device. If needed buy a useful lock box from Amazon and set time limits during which times you cannot get access to it!

### **EXERCISE:**

Regular exercise helps you sleep more soundly, as well as improving your general health. Teenagers should be aiming for at least **60 minutes** every day, even a brisk walk.

### FOOD:

Cut out the **caffeine**. Don't **binge** eat too close to bed time – especially not convenience sugary snacks! Opt for **healthy snacks** between revision & before bed. E.g. veggie sticks (carrots, peppers, cucumber with humous), a handful of nuts, mixed nuts with fruit, berries & bananas, wholewheat, multigrain toast etc – you know what's good grub! Always have a bottle of **water** on your desk.

# ROUTINES

Morning and evening routines are important – they help you to begin and end your day calmly (e.g. prepare desk/books for the next day,). Revision routines need to be put in place so you don't put it off. Embrace the job of revision and get it done early – you'll feel very satisfied with an hour or two under your belt by midday! A revision schedule might look like this:

**Warning:** revising straight after food on a full stomach can be hard and might make you feel sleepy... you may want to go for a short walk first!

When making a revision timetable first decide on the **template** that you know works for you, then add in the subjects & topics into those time slots. (e.g. if watching lunchtime Love Island is your holiday must-see, then accept that you are a Love Island addict & fit your work around it!)

### HANDY HINTS!

**MINDSET:** Revision in the holidays: Science says willpower is highest in the morning ... so start strong! If you revise in the morning you can free up afternoon time to exercise and have free time which will be guilt-free as you will feel a sense of satisfaction that you have already achieved a lot. **TO-DO LISTS:** Writing to-do lists helps! The act of drawing up a list and prioritising the items on it forces you to do a little extra work because you want to cross off the items you have listed for your day. It also helps to break down the mammoth task of 'revision' into achievable smaller chunks.

# WHAT'S THE BEST WAY TO REVISE?

- Different students use different approaches but, in every case, your best bet is to set out a **revision plan**.
- It's never too early to sort out how much work you have to cover. Establish how much **time** you have available between now and the exams, and then draw up a realistic timetable.
- In working out how much time you should devote to each subject, try to concentrate on your **weaknesses** without losing sight of your strong points.

### So I've set a revision plan, what next?

- Stick to it! That way you can keep track of how much work you've done and what you have left to cover.
- Choose a **place** in the house to revise where you won't be distracted.
- Make your **family** aware of the fact that you need some peace and quiet during this time, so they know not to disturb you.
- Switch revision between subjects to avoid becoming bored of a single topic.
- Look for **fresh sources** of information; the internet, for example, offers some interesting learning resources.
- Set yourself up with a **'reward'** after every revision session. Nothing extravagant, just a small treat to help you get back to your books.
- The most effective way to approach a revision session is to focus on **understanding** rather than memorising.

# MIND MAPPING BENEFITS FOR EXAMS

Mind Maps are particularly helpful to study for exams as they give you a broad, visual overview of each subject you are studying. They can help you to:

- Make connections between different topics or subject
- Create a broad overview of an area
- Plan your projects or exam revision
- Delve in-depth into an area

Mind Maps are widely recognised as an effective method to improve memory and understanding through the visual representation of information.

# TAKE REGULAR STUDY BREAKS

Do you feel **stressed, tired and that no new information is entering your head?** There is no point forcing yourself to study for hours upon hours as this will not result in a positive outcome. Taking regular study breaks and exercising is proven to engage your brain in studying and improve your exam performance in the long-run.

### understand your LEARNING STYLE

Everyone thinks that there is a best way to study but the reality is that **each person is different**. Once you understand whether you are a visual, auditory, reading/writing or kinaesthetic learner then remembering and recalling new information will become much easier.

# PRACTICE PRACTICE PRACTICE

One of the biggest recommendations that past students recommend is to **do as many past papers as you can**. Practising past papers will help you get familiar with the exam format, question style, time pressure and overall improve your ability to retrieve information quicker. If you find your class notes to be too much, why not divide the course study notes between trustworthy classmates and

share your notes with each other. This will reduce the amount of workload you need to do to prepare for your plus you will gain an insight into how other students learn. COLLABORATE WITH CLASSMATES

# **AVOIDING STRESS**

Stress is a perfectly normal reaction when things like exams are worrying you: but it's important to learn to deal with this...

- Talk to your friends about what's worrying you; you'll find you're not alone.
- Get enough **sleep** otherwise you'll become emotionally exhausted.
- Even if you aren't hungry, **eat** small regular meals with plenty of water.
- Have a **plan**. It means you're in control & don't let things pile up = less panic.
- Make sure you take time out of studying to do something relaxing. You should spend at least 10
  minutes of every hour to switch off.
- Physical exercise such as sport or yoga is very good for stress because it will take your mind off what's worrying you.
- Take a deep **breath**. If you take a few slow deep breaths to calm your normal breathing it will help you feel more in control.
- **Treat** yourself make sure you create 'you' time during which you go and do something that cheers you up.
- Find a **space** to work and revise that helps you...
- Turn your phone off this reduces stress and increases focus.
- Go for a **walk** take a break and get out in the open for a bit!
- Don't cram good **preparation** prevents poor performance!
- Positive thinking Go into an exam thinking that you know it all and that you are going to do really well!
- Play **music** Put some calm and relaxing music on to listen to on the way to the exam.

### REMEMBER ...

Some anxiety is **normal** (helpful even as a motivational force) but it becomes counterproductive if it becomes a normalised state and if it starts to impact on your moods and behaviours. Please do come and **talk to us** if we can help with any stresses and anxieties in this period. We can also recommended the very many support pages on our **virtual wellbeing hub**, which we hope may be a useful resource throughout this period.

The specification for the Mathematics GCSE (9-1) can be found <u>here</u> and you have a copy of this in the front of your folder. For Higher Tier there are 3 papers.

Each paper is worth 80 marks and all papers cover the whole specification, though some topics are clearly more likely to appear with or without a calculator. There is no choice of questions and each paper will have about 25 questions.

Please ensure that you have a complete Mathematics equipment set (protractor, pair of compasses, ruler, pencil, eraser) and a fully working scientific calculator.

**Timed conditions:** over the course of the coming months, you will sit some of the practice papers under timed conditions to help you get used to the pressure of the exams. Your teacher will direct you in this.

#### **REVISION RESOURCES:**

Here are the resources that are available on iLearn365 to revise for your GCSE Mathematics examinations. Your teacher will advise you on how best to utilise these resources.

- A. Full Paper Practice, to complete whole papers.
- B. General Revision, to perform targeted revision of a specific topic or skill or grade level.

#### **A. Full Paper Practice**

- Practice papers sets 5 to 26. Some sets comprise of three papers where the later ones tend to be two - a non-calculator and a combined calculator one. Mark schemes are in this folder on iLearn 365.
- 2. Past Papers: You have been given printed copies of the November 2022 and June 2022 examination series, papers 1H 2H and 3H and the latest exam board produced mock paper set 6 will be given to you at the start of study leave. You should complete these first, and mark using the mark schemes in this folder. Next complete the other papers for June and November (where available) for the years 2021, 2020, 2019, 2018, 2017 in this order. Other Mock and Specimen Papers are also in this folder.

Note: Past Papers for 2017, 2018, and 2019, and Mock Sets 1, 2, 3, 4 may also be accessed via DrFrostMaths - see How to access Past Papers on DFM.pdf

- 3. **Shadow Papers:** These are similar copies to the recent exam series papers but with different numbers so you may find it useful to go through particular papers you found difficult again.
- 4. **Churchill Papers:** These are fairly challenging papers, very good for pupils aiming for Grade 7 and above. All mark schemes in the folder.

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### B. General Revision

A mixture of targeted topic practice to hone specific topic skills, plus questions from a range of topics that practise skills at specific grade levels.

- 1. Aiming For... Grade 7 or Grade 9 mixed exam question booklets questions given in order of difficulty. Unlike usual GCSE papers, but excellent practice.
- 2. **Higher Topic Tests:** Past GCSE questions on specific topics (e.g. Algebra, Circles, Compound interest) that increase in difficulty. These do not cover all GCSE topics.

This holiday time is vital for revision for your languages exams; revising something every day is better for helping you retain a language rather than just a couple of longer sessions per week. There are ways of revising for each skills area: (these points refer to Higher level papers)



#### SPEAKING

Go through your **Speaking questions** and the answers you have written out throughout the course to familiarise yourself with specific vocab on each unit, complex structures and tenses on verbs used in common expressions.

Look at past Speaking cards to practise role plays and photocards.

Learn common words likely to appear on the photocard (a man, a woman, a child, countryside....)

Revise how to formulate questions.

In the exam, you will have 12 minutes preparation time beforehand, during which you may make notes to take in, then the exam lasts 10-12 minutes. You will have a role play, photo card and general conversation, as in the practice test you have taken in March.

- Be sure you know how to ask in the target language for a question to be repeated. Teachers are allowed to repeat the question for you.
- Don't use any English -if you're not sure of a word make sure what you do use sounds like it could be in the target language.
- The role play takes 1-2 minutes only and always includes one 'surprise' element – listen carefully for clues from what your teacher says.
- You have to ask a question, so practise formulating questions (including the question words).
- Use the informal or formal version of 'you' depending on what the role play instructions say.
- The photocard, which takes a maximum of 3 minutes, requires you to talk as much as possible. Try to add adjectives, talk about what you think the people in the picture are like, as well as what they're doing. Can you change tense?

- You know what the first 3 photocard questions are, but not the final 2. Listen carefully to these and try to develop your answer, giving more than just one sentence.
- Don't whisper to ask if what you said is OK

   everything is recorded!
- You have to give in your notes at the end of the photocard discussion. The notes are not assessed.
- The general conversation is the part where you have some control over what you talk about, as you get to nominate the first theme. This is your chance to really show off some fancy language as you can prepare the theme in advance. Be sure your teacher knows before the holiday what your first theme is, as they need to prepare too! The second theme of the conversation is set by the exam board.
- There will be questions for between 5 and 7 minutes, i.e. between 2 and 3 minutes on each of 2 themes.
- There is no requirement to answer a set number of topics or sub-topics within the theme -if you can answer fully, showing off your linguistic ability in just one sub-topic, then that is fine. It is at the discretion of the teacher to choose questions on the topics or sub-topics of each theme; they are likely to pick topics they think you know how to talk about!
- You must **ask at least one question** during the general conversation.

To practise, you should **time yourself preparing** for role plays and photocards. examples are in the pupil shared area.

You should also **record yourself** answering general conversation type questions and then play back your answers. See if you can apply the mark scheme to what you have said!

WRITING - the exam lasts 1hour 15 minutes.

- There are 2 short **essays** to write; 1 x **90 words** minimum (16 marks) and 1 x **150 words** minimum (32 marks). For each of these, there is a choice of question.
- Beware! You must **answer all the bullet points**, but not necessarily write the same amount for each.
- Remember to **show off** your target language skills all 3 verb tenses, opinions, justifications, lots of variety of vocab, adjectives, complex phrases including *if* or subjunctive.
- You may do rough work/planning in the question and answer booklet, but you must cross this out.
- Check for accuracy -verb endings, spellings, accents, irregular verb forms, agreement of adjectives...
- There is also a short **translation** into the target language. Expect to need to use more than one tense!

Practise by writing paragraphs. Can you remember your speaking preparation? – most of these phrases could be 'recycled' into your writing, as long as they fit the context!

**LISTENING** - the exam lasts 45 minutes. This is essentially like a vocab test. If you understand most of the words, you will usually be able to work out the sense of the passage or text, so revise the theme-based vocabulary.

- You must read the questions carefully and look at how many marks are available as that will give you a clue to how much detail to include.
- Answer in the correct language.
- Don't forget that some listening passages will contain the answers to more than one question this is usually shown clearly on the question paper.
- Answer every question, do not leave any blanks!
- Listen out for different tenses, negatives, or small words which can change the meaning of a phrase.

**READING** - the exam lasts 1 hour. Like the listening test, this is essentially a vocab test.

- Look out for the little words which change the meaning of a sentence, for example by making it negative.
- Look out for different verb tenses/forms (eg. 3rd person).
- Look out for the words like *however*, *but*, *or sometimes* which could show a difference of opinion.
- Read the questions carefully and look at the marks available.
- If you change your mind, make your new answer very clear, even if that means you have to write outside a box.
- There will also be a short translation into English; reread your work to check it makes sense.
- Answer every question, do not leave any blanks!


