## MAYNARD SUMMER CELEBRATION Thursday 4th July 2024

Good afternoon, Everyone!

My name is Fanny Balcombe and I am a Maynard Governor.

On behalf of Henry Luce, Chairman of The Maynard's Board of Governors, it is my privilege and huge pleasure to welcome you all to this Summer Celebration, at the culmination of the school's academic year. I speak for the whole Board when I say that we are proud and honoured to be Governors of this (as the Good Schools Guide puts it) 'wonderful school, this haven of calm, compassionate and creative education'.

As the retired Head of an all-girls', all-through 3-18 years, independent school, very similar to The Maynard, I applaud the choice you have all made, to entrust the education of your girls to the loving and enlightened professionalism of Mrs Gregory and the Maynard team. I also recognise the difficult financial decisions this choice entails. We are living in very uncertain times – and, especially, right now today, Election Day, with an as-yet indeterminate political landscape before us. These lyrics are from the song, 'For Good', from the musical Wicked and they have a resonance and a relevance for all of us here today. The people we meet can change us – for the good and maybe for good ie permanently. And it is at school that a young person's life massively opens up and expands. So, we do our best to choose wisely.

We are here today because you all have chosen wisely! In the Good Schools Guide, The Maynard is described as a wonderful school, full of intelligent, questioning, confident and kind girls who learn to fly on every level. Girls, your sense of self-worth is carefully and consistently nurtured at

The Maynard; your academic and personal successes are the result of the inclusive, focused and individually tailored teaching approach. Amongst schools, The Maynard is a treasure, unique and distinctive, which we cherish, and rightly so.

As for 'difficult financial decisions': what is more important than a child's future? What better investment?








#### Year 3 trip to Dawlish Warren

#### **Ten Tors**

A time-honoured custom returned to Maynard in early May - the return of a select few slightly damaged, but undaunted, students proudly limping to their lessons in Crocs and sliders! These were our wonderful Ten Tors students and, after undertaking the Ten Tors Challenge, they had every reason to be immensely proud.

After seven months preparation and training in conditions that ranged from 'Maybe it'll brighten up...' to '...surely we're not going out in that?', our four teams all completed 'the Beast' training weekend, in late March – proving they were ready for the real event by covering near-full distances in, once again, some seriously challenging conditions.

For those not familiar with Ten Tors, this is the annual expedition across Dartmoor, organised by the Army. Each team of six is given a different combination of checkpoints over the moor, covering either 35+ miles, 45+ miles or 55+ miles of wilderness. Whilst the distances and conditions are the real challenge, the teams must also race against the clock and the dreaded cut-off times to cross the finish line before it closes at 5pm on Sunday.

Our final week of preparations culminated with our four teams travelling down to basecamp at Okehampton Army Camp on Friday morning (10th May 2024). A full day of route-planning, checking and rechecking kit and equipment – and a little partying too – ensured the girls were ready for their early start on Saturday. Fast forward to 7am and the girls were lined up on the start line. Speeches were made by Ray Mears, the Red Devils parachuted in, soldiers fast-roped out of a helicopter to fire the big starting gun, and then 2400 young people were off!

The conditions were extremely challenging this year, with significant numbers of students and teams having to 'fall out', many because of the heat. At this point, it's worth recognising

the immense efforts of the combined Services that ensured the weekend unfolded safely. Indeed, at one point on Sunday, the Army were on the verge of calling a Halt Order on the whole event. So it was with very mixed emotions that we heard mid-morning, Sunday, that our wonderful 45s had also safely come off the moor. The team had done so well, but this was a new route, and it unfortunately stood out for having more than half of its teams having to 'crash-out'. Whatever the outcome, it should go without saying that we are immensely proud of what our 45s achieved under such extraordinary circumstances – they really were remarkable.

By late morning on Sunday, we still had three 35-mile teams in the event and the atmosphere was wonderful as the first of our teams crossed the finish at 11.40am, in front of 1000s of well-wishers, friends and family (including several of our old-girls too!). All three 35 Mile teams completed over the next few hours, each one crossing the line in their own unique 'style', adorned with unicorn headdresses, pink tutus and the like.

Well done, once again, to every one of our Ten Tors students. Each of them has accomplished something genuinely extraordinary!

Can I finally say a big thank you for all the support these girls have received along the way, especially from their long-suffering families! However, most of all, can I offer a huge vote of thanks to our amazing and generous volunteers, who have given so much time and energy to looking after our girls this year – it really couldn't have happened without you!
